Academic Information

If a student drops below a 2.0 overall GPA or 2.0 on 12 hours from the previous semester, the student may submit a housing appeal to be considered for continued living in University Housing. Academic appeals for University Housing must be submitted to the housing office by 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, December 17, 2008 for the spring semester and by 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 20, 2009 for the fall semester. Appeals will not be accepted after the deadline. If the student's appeal for the spring semester is denied or if the student did not appeal the student will be required to move out of the residence hall by December 19, 2008 or will be fined \$250 plus a weekly room rate until the student is checked out. If the student is not out by the 2nd business day of the re-opening of the University Housing office after Christmas break, a student's property will be removed from the residence hall and the student will be charged a \$300 disposal fee, \$250 fine and weekly room rate until checked out or evicted. The University will not be responsible for any damage or loss of property during the process.

- All housing resident students are required to maintain a 2.0 overall grade point average or must earn a 2.0 GPA on 12 hours or more from the previous semester.
- University Housing will notify students via their university email account on the Tuesday following commencement if they failed to meet the academic requirement to remain in housing. However, students are encouraged to log on to their LEONet account to check their grades as early as possible to determine their academic status and how that may impact their campus residency.
- Students who do not meet the academic requirement must submit an appeal to University Housing. Appeals must be received by the housing office on or before the Wednesday following commencement. Appeals received after this date will be denied.
- Students who filed a Housing Academic Appeal will be notified via their university email account on the Thursday following commencement if their appeal was approved or denied. If denied, the student must be completely moved out of the residence hall by the Friday following commencement.
- If you do not meet the academic requirements you need to meet with your academic advisor.

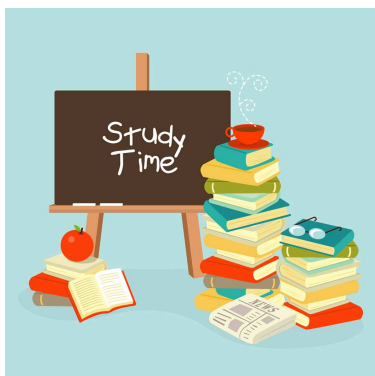

Checklist of Study Habits

Can you respond “YES!” to each of the following questions? Put a check mark next to the study habits that you do on a regular basis. For the items with no check mark, you’ve got work to do!

I participate in class discussions.	I organize information into logical lists, categories, or timelines.	
I ask questions when I don’t understand the material.	I try to think of real life examples when I learn new concepts.	
I try to sit close to the front of the class.	I study with at least one other person before a test.	
I am interested in learning new things, regardless of the subject matter.	I organize my notes into “known” and “unknown” as I prepare for a test.	
I am motivated to achieve.	I begin studying for a test far enough in advance to really learn the material.	
I create questions as I read my text chapters and assignments.	I select a good study location.	
I pay attention to chapter titles, sub-headings, graphs, illustrations, bold print, etc.	I take short breaks while studying.	
I look up unfamiliar words as I read.	I have all my study materials with me when I study.	
I identify main ideas and supporting details.	I avoid cramming for a test.	
I read assigned materials before class.	I know how to study for different kinds of tests (essay, true/false, multiple choice, etc.).	
I take notes on class lectures.	I read test instructions carefully.	
I take notes from my textbook.	I survey a test for length and question type.	
I review my notes before the next lecture or before reading the next textbook chapter.	I answer easy questions first.	
I review notes immediately after class.	I watch for “absolute qualifiers” in test questions (always, never).	
I rewrite or type my lecture notes.	I make the best guess possible when I don’t know the answer.	
I compare notes with classmates when I need clarification.	I prioritize my “to-do” lists.	
I use memory techniques, like acronyms, jingles, sentences, etc.	I create short and long term academic goals.	
I create visuals, such as sketches, charts and maps.	I allow 2 hours of study time for each hour of class time.	
I review course notes until I can easily recall the information.	I start projects early.	
I rewrite text and lecture notes into my own words.	I turn in assignments on time.	
I anticipate different kinds of test questions as I read.	I avoid “time-wasters.”	
I write test questions in the margins of my notes.	I complete even the most challenging tasks.
