Non-Returning Student Survey of First-Time Freshmen with an ACT Composite of 24 or Higher

Fall 2003

Executive Summary

In Fall 2003, the Office of Institutional Research and Assessment conducted a telephone survey of students who were first-time freshmen in Fall 2002 with an ACT of 24 or higher, but were not enrolled in Fall 2003. The goal of the survey was to gather information on why they left Southeastern, and if they plan to return in the future.

Thirty-one participants were contacted and agreed to complete the survey. The survey covered four general areas of questioning: whether students plan on returning, reasons why students might stop attending Southeastern for a while, reasons why students might permanently leave Southeastern, and demographic information not readily available in PeopleSoft.

Some highlights of the Non-Returning Student Survey are:

- More than 70% on the respondents plan on continuing their education elsewhere.
- Of the nine possible reasons presented to respondents who stopped attending Southeastern for a while, "needed to earn more money" and "had family responsibilities to take care of" were most often cited as a reason.
- Of the thirty-seven possible reasons presented to respondents who left Southeastern permanently, "decided to attend a different college" and 'the major you wanted was not available at Southeastern" were most often indicated as a reason.

Method

Participants

The survey sample included all eighty-nine first-time freshmen in Fall 2002 with an ACT Composite of 24 or higher who did not return in Fall 2003 and had not been suspended. Of the sample, 37.1% (n=33) had bad telephone numbers, 2.2% (n=2) were currently enrolled after the 14th class day, and 22.5% (n=20) were unable to be contacted. Of those contacted, 8.8% (n=3) refused to complete the survey. Thirty-one participants completed the survey, for a response rate of 91.2% (n=31).

Fifty-two percent (52%) of the respondents were female, and 48% were male. Eighty-seven percent (87%) were White, Non-Hispanic, 7% were Hispanic, 3% Black, Non-Hispanic, and 3% had an unknown ethnicity.

Procedure

The survey was administered by telephone, using trained and experienced IR staff. The survey was conducted Monday-Thursday, during the day and evening.

Instrument

The survey first asked a series of questions to determine if students planned on returning to Southeastern in the future. Respondents who indicated they did not plan on returning to Southeastern were given a list of thirty-seven possible reasons why a student might leave college, and were asked to rate whether it was a major reason, a minor reason, or not a reason at all in their decision to leave Southeastern. Respondents who indicated that they did plan to continue their education at Southeastern were first asked when they planned to return to Southeastern. They were then given a list of nine possible reasons why a student might stop attending Southeastern for a while, and were asked to rate whether each item was a major reason, a minor reason, or not a reason at all in their decision to "stop-out." The final section asked for demographic information that is not collected as part of the application or registration process, such as how far they had to travel (one way) to Southeastern's main campus. The entire survey can be found in Appendix A.

Results

What are Students' Intentions?

The first portion of the survey obtained information on respondents' current intention. Based on these responses, students can be classified into two groups: 1) Drop-Outs, those respondents who no longer plan on continuing their education at Southeastern, including those who plan on or have transferred elsewhere; 2) Stop-Outs, those respondents who plan to return to Southeastern to complete their degree. Based on these definitions, 77% (n=24) of the respondents are Drop-Outs, and 23% (n=7) are Stop-Outs. These are considerably different percentages compared to the Fall 1999 Non-Returning Student Survey results, when 49% (n=178) were Drop-Outs, 49% (n=179) were Stop-Outs, and 3% (n=10) were respondents who never intended to obtain a degree.

Stop-Outs

The majority of the Stop-Outs (57%, n=4) plan on returning to Southeastern in Spring 2004, with 29% (n=2) planning on returning within the next year and 14% (n=1) planning on returning in the next two years.

Stop-Outs were then asked to indicate whether each of nine possible reasons was a Major Reason, a Minor Reason, or Not a Reason for their decision to stop attending Southeastern for a while. The two most cited reasons for their decision not to return to Southeastern were "Needed to earn more money" (72%, n=5) and "Had family responsibilities to take care of" (72%, n=5).

Table 1 provides the percentage of endorsement for Major Reason, Minor Reason, and Not a Reason for each item.

Drop-Outs

Most of the Drop-Outs (92%, n=22) intend to finish their education elsewhere, although only 55% (n=12) of the those respondents have already enrolled in another school. When asked what school they have or will enroll in, the most commonly cited school was Louisiana State University. Table 2 provides the schools respondents identified as having enrolled in or planning to enroll in.

Respondents were then asked what was the main reason they decided to attend another school. Seventeen percent (17%, n=4) of the respondents indicated they wanted to attend a school closer to home, with an additional 17% (n=4) of the respondents signifying they decided to attend another school because the major or program they were interested in was not available at Southeastern.

Next, Drop-Outs were asked to indicate whether each of thirty-seven possible reasons was a Major Reason, a Minor Reason, or Not a Reason for their decision to leave Southeastern. "Decided to attend a different college" was the item with the largest endorsement, with 75.0% (n=18) of the respondents indicating it was the reason they left Southeastern. This was followed by "The major you wanted was not available at Southeastern" which 45.8% (n=11) of respondents endorsed as a reason they left.

Table 3 provides the percentage of endorsement for Major Reason, Minor Reason, and Not a Reason for each item.

Demographics of Drop-Outs and Stop-Outs

The last portion of the survey asked participants for demographic information that is not readily available as part of the PeopleSoft system. Answers to these questions help give a better understanding as to what type of student will leave Southeastern either temporarily or permanently. Twenty-nine percent (29%, n=9)of the respondents lived on campus, while an additional 29% (n=9) commuted more than 30 miles (one way) to Southeastern's main campus. Thirty-nine percent (39%, n=10) of those who worked, spent 21-30 hours a week working, while 35% (n=9) spent 11-20 hours a week working. Twenty-three (23%, n=7) of the respondents are first-generation college students, which is a student who has no parent with any college or university experience.
