Non-Returning Student Survey Fall 2004

Office of Institutional Research & Assessment Distributed April 2005

Executive Summary

In Fall 2004, the Office of Institutional Research and Assessment conducted a telephone survey of students who were in the Fall 2003 cohort, but were not enrolled in Fall 2004. The goal of the survey was to gather information on why these students left Southeastern, and if they plan to return in the future.

Ninety-six participants were contacted and agreed to complete the survey. The survey covered four general areas of questioning: whether students plan on returning, reasons why students might stop attending Southeastern for a while, reasons why students might permanently leave Southeastern and demographic information not readily available in PeopleSoft.

Some highlights of the Non-Returning Student Survey are:

- Fifty-five percent (55%) of the respondents plan on continuing their education elsewhere.
- Of the nine possible reasons presented to respondents who stopped attending Southeastern for a while, "needed to earn more money," "had family responsibilities to take care of" and "needed a break from school" were most often cited as a reason.
- Of the forty possible reasons presented to respondents who left Southeastern permanently, "decided to attend a different college," "moved to a new location" and "tired of commuting to Southeastern" were most often indicated as a reason.
- Fifty-three percent (53%) of Drop-Outs had to commute more than 30 miles (one way) to Southeastern's main campus, compared to 23% of the Stop-Outs.
- Sixty-two percent (62%) of the Drop-Outs were female, compared to 56% of the Stop-Outs.
- Nineteen percent (19%) of the Drop-Outs were Black, non-Hispanic females. None of the Drop-Outs were Black, non-Hispanic males. In contrast, 9% of the Stop-Outs were Black, non-Hispanic females and 7% were males.
- In general, Stop-Outs worked more while at Southeastern than did Drop-Outs. Thirty-two percent (32%) of the Drop-Outs did not work, compared to 18.6% of the Stop-Outs. Of the Stop-Outs who worked, 50% worked more than 30 hours per week, while only 25% of the Drop-Outs worked more than 30 hours per week.
- The average ACT composite for Drop-Outs was 21.1, compared to 20.1 for Stop-Outs. Most (47%) of the Stop-Outs had an ACT composite of 20-23, with 28% of Drop-Outs having an ACT score in the same range. On the other hand, a majority (32%) of the Drop-Outs had an ACT composite of 24 or higher, while 16% of Stop-Outs had an ACT in the same range.

Method

Participants

The survey population was 686 students in the Fall 2003 cohort who did not return in Fall 2004 and had not been suspended. Of the population, 10.5% (n=72) had bad telephone numbers and 74.5% (n=511) could not be contacted. Of the 103 contacted, 6.8% (n=7) refused to complete the survey. Ninety-six participants completed the survey, for a response rate of 93.2%.

Table 1 provides a comparison of the demographics between the survey sample and the population.

Procedure

The survey was administered by telephone, using trained and experienced IR staff and student workers. The survey was conducted Monday-Friday, during the day and evening.

Instrument

The survey first asked a series of questions to determine if students planned on returning to Southeastern in the future. Respondents who indicated they did not plan on returning to Southeastern were given a list of forty possible reasons why a student might leave college, and were asked to rate whether it was a major reason, a minor reason, or not a reason at all in their decision to leave Southeastern. Respondents who indicated that they did plan to continue their education at Southeastern were first asked when they planned to return to Southeastern. They were then given a list of nine possible reasons why a student might stop attending Southeastern for a while, and were asked to rate whether each item was a major reason, a minor reason, or not a reason at all in their decision to "stop-out." The final section asked for demographic information that is not collected as part of the application or registration process, such as how far they had to travel (one way) to Southeastern's main campus. The entire survey can be found in Appendix A.

Results

What are Students' Intentions?

The first portion of the survey obtained information on respondents' current intention. Based on these responses, students can be classified into two groups: 1) Drop-Outs, those respondents who no longer plan on continuing their education at Southeastern, including those who plan on or have transferred elsewhere; 2) Stop-Outs, those respondents who plan to return to Southeastern to complete their degree. Based on these definitions, 55.2% (n=53) of the respondents are Drop-Outs, and 44.8% (n=43) are Stop-Outs.

Stop-Outs

The majority of the Stop-Outs (55.8%, n=24) plan on returning to Southeastern in Spring 2005 (66.7%, n=16, actually returned), with 27.9% (n=12) planning on returning within the next year, 4.7% (n=2) planning on returning in the next two years and 11.6% (n=5) not sure when they will be returning.

Stop-Outs were then asked to indicate whether each of nine possible reasons was a Major Reason, a Minor Reason, or Not a Reason for their decision to stop attending Southeastern for a while. The two most cited reasons for their decision not to return to Southeastern were "Needed to earn more money" (51.2%, n=22) and "Had family responsibilities to take care of" (51.2%, n=22).

Table 2 provides the percentage of endorsement for Major Reason, Minor Reason, and Not a Reason for each item.

Drop-Outs

Most of the Drop-Outs (84.9%, n=45) intend to finish their education elsewhere. Of these students, 75.5% (n=40) have already enrolled in another Institution. When asked what institution they have or will enroll in, the most commonly cited was Louisiana State University. Table 3 provides the institutions respondents identified as having enrolled in or planning to enroll in.

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Respondents were then asked what their main reason was for deciding to attend another school. Fifteen percent (15.1%, n=8) of the respondents indicated they decided to attend another school because the major or program they were interested in was not available at Southeastern, with an additional 7.5% (n=4) of the respondents signifying they wanted to attend a school closer to home.

Next, Drop-Outs were asked to indicate whether each of forty possible reasons was a Major Reason, a Minor Reason, or Not a Reason in their decision to leave Southeastern. "Decided to attend a different college" was the item with the largest endorsement, with 84.9% (n=45) of the respondents indicating it was the reason they left Southeastern. This was followed by "Moved to a new location," which 45.3% (n=24) of respondents endorsed as a reason they left.

Table 4 provides the percentage of endorsement for Major Reason, Minor Reason, and Not a Reason for each item.

Demographics of Drop-Outs and Stop-Outs

The last portion of the survey asked participants for demographic information that is not readily available as part of the PeopleSoft system. Answers to these questions help give a better understanding as to what type of student will leave Southeastern either temporarily or permanently. Forty percent (39.6%, n=38) of the respondents commuted more than 30 miles (one way) to campus, while an additional 15.6% (n=15) commuted between 21 and 30 miles (one way) to Southeastern's main campus. Of those who worked, 37.1% (n=26) spent more than 30 hours a week working, while 28.6% (n=20) spent 11-20 hours a week working. Thirty-three

percent (33.3%, n=32) of the respondents are first-generation college students, which is a student who has no parent with any college or university experience.

Tables 5 and 6 provide a comparison of the demographic characteristics of Stop-Outs and Drop-Outs.
