Survey of Non-Returning Graduate Students

Spring 2006

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Executive Summary

In Spring 2006, the Office of Institutional Research and Assessment conducted a telephone survey of graduate students who were enrolled in Spring 2005, but were not enrolled in Spring 2006 and had not received a Masters degree from Southeastern. The goal of the survey was to gather information on why these students left Southeastern. In addition, the survey wanted to determine if they have completed their goal for attending the university, and if they plan to return in the future.

One hundred sixty-seven (167) participants were contacted and agreed to complete the survey. The survey covered five general areas of questioning: whether students intended on getting a Masters degree, if they plan on returning, reasons why students might stop attending Southeastern for a while, reasons why students might permanently leave Southeastern and demographic information not readily available in PeopleSoft. Results of the survey were then compared with results for Southeastern's Fall 2004 Non-Returning Undergraduate Student Survey to determine if there are identifiable differences between non-returning graduates students and non-returning undergraduate students.

Some highlights of the Survey of Non-Returning Graduate Students are:

- Of the forty possible reasons presented to respondents who left Southeastern permanently, "decided to attend a different college," "impersonal attitudes of college faculty and/or staff" and "academic advising was inadequate" were most often indicated as a reason. While "decided to attend a different college" was also the most indicated reason by students from the Fall 2004 Non-Returning Undergraduate Student Survey, "moved to a new location" and "tired of commuting to Southeastern" were the second and third most indicated reasons for not returning to Southeastern for undergraduates.
- Fifty-two percent (52%) of the degree-seeking students plan on continuing their education at Southeastern. Forty-six percent (46%) of these students plan on returning next semester, while thirty-seven percent (37%) plan on returning within the next year.
- Of the nine possible reasons presented to respondents who stopped attending Southeastern for a while, "had family responsibilities to take care of," "work interfered with school" and "needed a break from school" were most often cited as a reason. These responses are similar to those from the undergraduate survey where "needed to earn more money," "had family responses to take care of" and "needed a break from school" were the most cited reasons for not returning to Southeastern.
- Fifty-seven percent (57%) of the non degree-seeking students have completed their goal for attending Southeastern.

Method

Participants

The survey population was 699 graduate students who were not enrolled in Spring 2006, but had been enrolled in Spring 2005. None of these students had received a Masters degree from Southeastern. Of the population, 13.4% (n=94) had bad telephone numbers, 1.4%, (n=10) had been asked by the university not to return and 0.3% (n=2) were deceased. Institutional Research and Assessment attempted, but was unsuccessful, in contacting 56.2% (n=393) of the population. Of the 200 contacted, 16.5% (n=33) refused to complete the survey. One hundred sixty-seven (167) participants completed the survey, for a response rate of 83.5%.

Table 1 provides a comparison of the demographics between the survey sample and the population.

Procedure

The survey was administered by telephone, using trained and experienced IR staff and student workers. The survey was conducted Monday-Friday, during the day and evening, from March 15^{th} – April 21^{st} , 2006.

Instrument

The first section of the survey asked participants if they had intended to get a Masters degree when they began as a graduate student at Southeastern. Respondents who indicated they did not intend to get a Masters degree were then asked if they had completed their goal for attending Southeastern, while those who indicated that they did intend to get a Masters degree were then asked a series of questions to determine if they planned on returning to Southeastern in the future. Participants who indicated they did not plan on returning to Southeastern were given a list of forty possible reasons why a student might leave college, and were asked to rate whether it was a major reason, a minor reason, or not a reason at all in their decision to leave Southeastern. Students who indicated that they did plan to continue their education at Southeastern were first asked when they planned to return to Southeastern. They were then given a list of ten possible reasons why a student might stop attending Southeastern for a while, and were asked to rate whether each item was a major reason, a minor reason, or not a reason at all in their decision to "stop-out." The final section asked for demographic information that is not collected as part of the application or registration process, such as how far they had to travel (one way) to Southeastern's main campus. The entire survey can be found in Appendix A.

Results

Comparison of Survey Participant Responses to University Records

The first question of the survey instrument asked participants if they intended to get a Masters degree when they first enrolled as a graduate student at Southeastern. Based on the responses, 52.7% (n=88) said they did intend to get a Masters degree and 47.3% (n=79) said they did not. However, the students' responses to their degree intentions do not necessarily agree with Southeastern's official records. According to official Spring 2005 records, 40.7% (n=68) of the respondents were enrolled in a degree seeking program, while 59.3% (n=99) were not. Table 2 provides a comparison of the degree seeking status of the participants based on their responses and the type of degree program they were enrolled in.

As can been seen in the above table, of the eighty-eight (88) respondents who indicated they intended to obtain a masters degree when they enrolled at Southeastern, twenty-eight (28) where not enrolled in a degree-seeking program. According to Southeastern records, 35.7% (n=10) of these (28) students were seeking Add-On certification, while an additional 35.7% (n=10) were categorized as Graduate Non-Degree seeking.

Likewise, eight (8) of the respondents who indicated they did not intend to get a masters degree were actually enrolled in a degree seeking graduate program the last semester they were enrolled at Southeastern. These students were majoring in Administration and Supervision, Curriculum and Instruction, English, Health and Kinesiology, or Special Education. Three (3) of the above eight respondents also indicated they had completed their goal for attending the university.

What are Degree-Seeking Students' Intentions?

Of the 167 survey participants, 40.7% (n=68) were officially enrolled in a degree-seeking program in Spring 2005. However, 11.8% (n=8) of these students indicated that they did not intend to get a Masters degree when they started as a graduate student at Southeastern. Five of the above eight students indicated that they had completed their goal for attending Southeastern.

The remainder of the degree-seeking students (n=60) can be classified into two groups: 1)Drop-Outs, those respondents who no longer plan on continuing their education at Southeastern, including those who plan on or have transferred elsewhere; 2)Stop-Outs, those respondents who

plan to return to Southeastern to complete their degree. Based on these definitions, 41.7% (n=25) are Drop-Outs and 58.3% (n=35) are Stop-Outs.

Degree-Seeking Stop-Outs

The majority of the Stop-Outs (45.7%, n=16) plan on returning to Southeastern in Fall 2006, with 37.1% (n=13) planning on returning within the next year, 2.9% (n=1) planning on returning in the next five years and 11.4% (n=4) not sure when they will be returning.

Stop-Outs were then asked to indicate whether each of ten possible reasons was a Major Reason, a Minor Reason, or Not a Reason for their decision to stop attending Southeastern for a while. The two most cited reasons for their decision not to return to Southeastern were "had family responsibilities to take care of" (76.5%, n=26), "needed a break from school" (47.1%, n=16) and "work interfered with school" (44.1%, n=15).

Table 3 provides the percentage of endorsement for Major Reason, Minor Reason, and Not a Reason for each item.

Degree-Seeking Drop-Outs

Most of the Drop-Outs (80.0%, n=20) intend to finish their education elsewhere. Of these students, 65.0% (n=13) have already enrolled in another institution. When asked what institution they have or will enroll in, the most commonly cited were Southern University and Louisiana State University.

Table 4 provides the institutions respondents identified as having enrolled in or planning to enroll in.

Respondents were then asked what was their main reason for deciding to attend another school. Twenty percent (20.0%, n=4) of the respondents indicated they were either dropped from the program they were in or not accepted into the program they wanted in, with an additional 15.0% (n=3) of the respondents signifying they decided to attend another school because the major or program they were interested in was not available at Southeastern.

Next, Drop-Outs were asked to indicate whether each of forty possible reasons was a Major Reason, a Minor Reason, or Not a Reason in their decision to leave Southeastern. "Decided to attend a different college" was the item with the largest endorsement, with 52.0% (n=13) of the respondents indicating it was a reason they left Southeastern. This was followed by "Impersonal attitudes of college faculty and/or staff," which 32.0% (n=8) of respondents endorsed as a reason they left.

Table 5 provides the percentage of endorsement for Major Reason, Minor Reason, and Not a Reason for each item.

What are Non Degree-Seeking Students' Intentions?

Fifty-nine percent (59%, n=99) of the 167 survey participants were officially enrolled as non degree-seeking students in Spring 2005. Seventy-two percent (72%, n=71) of the non degree-seeking students indicated that they indeed did not intend to get a Masters degree when they started as graduate students at Southeastern. Of these students, 78.9% (n=56) have completed their goal for attending Southeastern. For the students who have not completed their goal for attending Southeastern, "to get additional certification" was most often stated as their goal.

On the other hand, of the ninety-nine non degree-seeking students, 28.3% (n=28) indicated that they did intend to get a Masters degree when they started as a graduate student at Southeastern. These students can be classified into two groups: 1)Drop-Outs, those respondents who no longer plan on continuing their education at Southeastern, including those who plan on or have transferred elsewhere; 2)Stop-Outs, those respondents who plan to return to Southeastern to complete their degree. Based on these definitions, 39.3 % (n=11) are Drop-Outs and 60.7 % (n=17) are Stop-Outs.

Non Degree-Seeking Stop-Outs

The majority of the Stop-Outs (41.2%, n=7) plan on returning to Southeastern within the next year, with 29.4% (n=5) planning on returning in Fall 2006, 5.9% (n=1) planning on returning within the next two years and 17.7% (n=3) not sure when they will be returning.

Stop-Outs were then asked to indicate whether each of ten possible reasons was a Major Reason, a Minor Reason, or Not a Reason for their decision to stop attending Southeastern for a while.

The two most cited reasons for their decision not to return to Southeastern were "had family responsibilities to take care of" and "work interfered with school".

Table 6 provides the percentage of endorsement for Major Reason, Minor Reason, and Not a Reason for each item.

Non Degree-Seeking Drop-Outs

Most of the Drop-Outs (54.5%, n=6) intend to finish their education elsewhere. Of these students, 50.0% (n=3) have already enrolled in another institution. When asked what institution they have or will enroll in, the most commonly cited were Southern University and Louisiana State University.

Table 7 provides the institutions respondents identified as having enrolled in or planning to enroll in.

Demographics of Degree-Seeking and Non Degree-Seeking Students

The last portion of the survey asked participants for demographic information that is not readily available as part of the PeopleSoft system. Answers to these questions help give a better understanding as the differences between degree-seeking and non degree-seeking students. Fifty-three percent (52.7%, n=88) of the respondents commuted more than 30 miles (one way) to campus, while an additional 17.4% (n=29) commuted between 21 and 30 miles (one way) to Southeastern's main campus. Of those who worked, 85.2% (n=121) spent more than 30 hours a week working, while 4.9% (n=7) spent 11-20 hours a week working. Thirty-seven percent (37.0%, n=61) of the respondents are first-generation college students, which is a student who has no parent with any college or university experience.

Table 9 provides a comparison of the demographic characteristics of degree-seeking and non degree-seeking students.
