

# **Longitudinal Enrollment**

Southeastern's total student enrollment decreased by 15.4% from the Summer 2000 semester to the Summer 2001 semester. This reflects a 18.3% decrease in undergraduate enrollment and a 2.7% decrease in graduate enrollment. Graduate enrollment includes students in Alternate Certification Programs.

#### **First-time Freshman ACT Scores**

The average ACT Composite score for first-time freshmen increased from 17.8 in spring 2000 to 18.9 in Spring 2001; the average ACT English score increased from 17.3 to 18.9; the average ACT math score increased from 16.4 to 17.4.

# Full-time Equivalent (FTE) Students Taught

The number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students taught decreased 13.7% from the Summer 2000 semester to the Summer 2001 semester. (Note: These FTE calculations are based on the undergraduate and graduate hours taught by departments. These calculations will differ from FTE calculations based on the student classification of undergraduate and graduate.) The number of full-time equivalent undergraduate students equals the total undergraduate student credit hour (SCH) production divided by 6, and the number of full-time equivalent graduate equals the total graduate SCH production divided by 4.

#### **Average Course Loads**

The average course load of undergraduate students is 5.6 hours which is the same as Summer 2000. The average course load for graduate students (including Alternate Certification students, Master's plus 30, and Extended Studies students) is 4.9 hours, which is an decrease from 5.0 in Summer 2000. In Summer, a full-time undergraduate student is enrolled in 6 or more hours and full-time graduate students in 4 or more hours. Part-time undergraduate students are enrolled in less than 6 hours and graduate students in less than 4 hours.



#### **Enrollment by Gender**

The number of female students enrolled at Southeastern decreased by 15.5% from Summer 2000 to Summer 2001; male students decreased 15.1%. There were a total of 3,745 female students enrolled and 1,620 male students enrolled.
