Entrance into Foreign Language Courses

The Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures offers work in the fields of French, German, Italian, Latin, Mythology and Spanish. With the exception of Mythology, courses in these languages may be used to satisfy the language requirements of the curricula in the College of Arts and Sciences and to offer a major and/or minor in these fields in the College of Arts and Sciences and the College of Education. The curriculum leading to a major and/or minor in foreign languages is designed to meet the needs of students who wish to pursue further graduate training, who seek a variety of positions in which the knowledge of a foreign language is required and/or desirable, who wish to teach at the elementary and/or secondary school levels, and who, it is hoped, simply desire to acquire the knowledge of the language and of the cultural heritage of another country.

Entrance into Foreign Language Courses

Students may seek entrance into foreign language courses numbered 102, 201, 202, and advanced level (300 and above) by receiving a passing grade on the appropriate departmental entrance test. These tests are offered at designated times during registration period. Tests at each level in each language may be taken only once by a given student. Entrance tests are not credit exams and carry absolutely no academic credit.

A student who is permitted to enter a course above the 101 level on the basis of entrance testing may receive a grade of "P" in the course(s) he or she is permitted to skip over, if and when the student receives a passing grade in the course into which entrance has been permitted, provided that the student in question is not a native speaker. A native speaker is defined as one who was brought up speaking the language in question in the home and/or in foreign schools. The Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures reserves the right to determine whether or not a student is a native speaker, on the basis of any tests it deems appropriate.

Students may not receive credit in courses numbered below 300 in their native language. Students whose native

language is one of those offered at Southeastern Louisiana University may satisfy the foreign language requirement in one of the following ways:

1. By earning a total of 12 credit hours in any language courses other than their native language.

2. By earning a total of 12 credit hours in any language courses in their native language numbered above 300.

Honors Diploma in the Discipline

The department also offers an upper-division honors curriculum allowing its students to earn an honors diploma in the major at graduation. For information about requirements and honors courses in this department, please contact the Department Head.

Foreign Study Opportunities

The Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures maintains ties with institutions of higher education in many countries. Summer coursework through Southeastern Louisiana University is offered regularly in a variety of international locations.

Foreign Language Laboratory

Southeastern Louisiana University provides a language laboratory for use by students registered in foreign language courses. Students may use the laboratory at their convenience in order to increase their proficiency in the language and as a supplement to classroom instruction.

Majors

For a major in a foreign language, the requirement is thirty (30) semester hours in advanced courses (300 and above) in one language. Students enrolled in FLAN courses will study the language in which they are pursuing their degree.

All students are required to choose from the following: French or Spanish 310, 311, 312, 314, 319, 320, 324, 325, 326, 329, and 423.

Minors

A student who majors in a foreign language (French or Spanish) is required to have a minor. Students wishing to minor in foreign languages (French, Italian, Latin, or Spanish) are required to complete a total of eighteen (18) semester hours, six (6) of which must be at the 300 level or above.

In addition to a minor in French, Italian, Latin, or Spanish, the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures administers three interdisciplinary minors: Francophone and Creole Ethnic Studies, Hispanic Studies and Native American Studies. These minors consist of eighteen (18) hours each and include the following course requirements.

1. MINOR IN FRANCOPHONE AND CREOLE ETHNIC STUDIES:

Required Courses: French 201, Intermediate French I French 202, Intermediate French II French 324, Francophone Civilization and Culture

Nine additional hours must be chosen from: French 326, Franchophone Literature French 314, French Culture and Civilization History 435, The Caribbean Area History 408, Local and Regional History Sociology 411, Race and Ethnic Relations History 488, Oral History Techniques Geography 432, World Regional Geography II [Alternates for these courses must be approved by the Head of the Department]

2. MINOR IN HISPANIC ETHNIC STUDIES

Required Courses: Spanish 201, Intermediate Spanish I Spanish 202, Intermediate Spanish II Spanish 314, Hispanic Civilization or Spanish 324, Latin American Culture and Civilization

Nine additional hours must be chosen from:

Spanish 423, Special Topics (when content is appropriate) History 431, History of Latin America History 432, The Emergence of Latin America from Colonialism to Modern Nationalism History 436, History of Mexico Sociology 411, Race and Ethnic Relations History 408, Local and Regional History History 408, Local and Regional History History 488, Oral History Techniques Geography 432, World Regional Geography II Anthropology 405, North American Indian Mythology 204, Mesoamerican Mythology Mythology 205, South American Mythology [Alternates for these courses must be approved by the Head of the Department]

3. NATIVE AMERICAN STUDIES

Required Courses: Anthropology 405, North American Indian English 392, Studies in Native American Literature Mythology 204, Mesoamerican Mythology or Mythology 205, South American Mythology

Nine additional hours must be chosen from the following: Anthropology 101, Cultural Anthropology Anthropology 301, Exploring Archaeology Anthropology 403, Archaeological Studies Cultural Resource Management 421, Museology Cultural Resource Management 491, Field Training Geography 401, Historical Geography of the United States Geography 410, Cultural Geography History 478, The American Frontier History 478, Oral History Techniques Spanish 324, Latin American Civilization Sociology 411, Race and Ethnic Relations [Alternates for these courses must be approved by the Head of the Department]
